Married once before, Patricia had two beautiful teenage daughters and although Aaron loved his new family, he longed for the experience of being a father to his own child. Shortly after their wedding, Aaron and Patricia made plans to expand their family.

The first pregnancy was the hardest because at 10 weeks they told everyone. Miscarriage after miscarriage their hopes turned to heartaches and they decided to give up their dream of another child.

United in their love they made big changes including a move and a new career for Patricia. They tried to pick up the feeling of brokenness and forge forward. As fate would have it, soon after settling in they were pregnant yet again. "It didn't matter, because it wasn't going to stay" Aaron said. Nonetheless, the baby did stay. At four months into the pregnancy and with hope restored, they visited a positive and natural midwife they met previously.

It wasn't until the first ultrasound that they detected a devastating situation. There was a 91% chance of Down syndrome. For the Bakewells, this little bundle was a blessing and the family excitedly prepared for the arrival of the new baby in the loving environment of their home. Sammy was born beautiful and healthy.

With Sammy's arrival her parents worried about the financial challenges of physical and speech-language therapy. At just four months old, Sammy and her family were introduced to A Step Ahead in Pierce County (ASAPC). Although they had private insurance, they were unsure how all her therapy needs would be financed, and ASAPC was the only agency who approved them for financial aid. This aid was provided through the CARES Fund which covers the costs of uncompensated care, so every child receives the necessary therapeutic support they need.

Today, Sammy is almost three years old, and she bubbles with excitement and joy. Her bright eyes are captivating and her smile is contagious. Everyone she meets instantly falls in love with her. She is a delightfully happy, loving, and determined little girl.



Over the past 4 years, with your help we have put forth a lot of effort to build capacity in order to meet the needs of more children with more complex conditions. For instance, 10% of the children in our program are either diagnosed, or likely to be diagnosed, with autism; 10-15% of the children are in foster care; and a significant number of children have intensive medical needs. Consequently, we realized that we needed to increase the number of staff members with specialized training. In response to the this need we have:

- Added four therapists and a children's mental health provider to our staff
- Added additional play groups and field trips to serve more children in a variety of settings
- Invested in trainings for our providers that include:

Infant and toddler feeding – to help children on feeding tubes eat by mouth

Sensory Processing techniques – to help children calm their bodies and focus better


A teaching curriculum tailored for children on the Autism Spectrum

Infant Mental Health – to help with early trauma, such as abuse and neglect

These activities have renewed our enthusiasm and commitment to help all the children in our community grow and develop as best they can.
